

My main area of interest is in the Poor Law 1601-1900. However, there is much more to be found in the Quarter Sessions records than most people imagine, and I hope to encourage researchers to use these records more.

But what about the role of dogs in the trenches? Armies on both sides of the Western Front drafted in dogs to provide transportation on the battlefield, carry food and other supplies between trenches and, in the Belgian army, pull guns. Their physicality and trainability meant that dogs were perhaps the most versatile animal on the battlefield. They were mobilised as guard dogs, messenger dogs, laid telegraph wires, and located injured soldiers in no man's land
