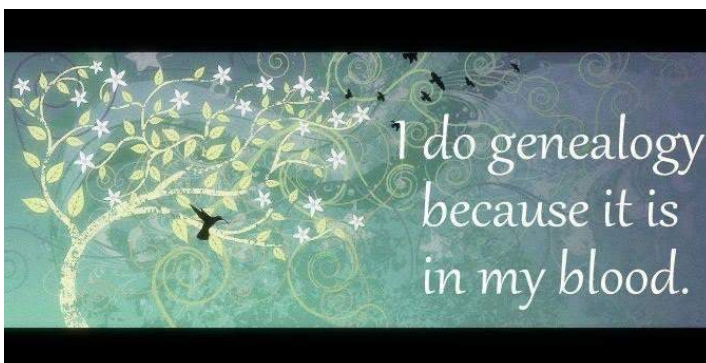
**The Pleasure Palace

Inside the 'Little Castle' at Bolsover lies a mystery. Bolsover castle has long since been known as a playground for the rich and powerful, but just what is the hidden meaning in the artwork? Can you figure out the secret message that lies within these 17th century masterpieces as we take a tour of this 'Pleasure Palace'? When William Cavendish, the grandson of the legendary Bess of Hardwick, left us this puzzle he was showing us that he had a real sense of fun and a sharp mind....or was he?



Bolsover Castle was designed purely to entertain and impress visitors, including King Charles I and his court in 1634. Completed utterly regardless of expense by William Cavendish, later Duke of Newcastle.
